SUBJECT: Thank you for the opportunity to review and comment on the ISA

The Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics (the Academy) would like to thank the Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) for the opportunity to provide comments on the Interoperability Standards Advisory (ISA). The Academy commends the ONC for compiling and publishing a list of all available standards to promote interoperability in healthcare.

The Academy is the world's largest organization of food and nutrition professionals, representing more than 107,000 registered dietitians, dietetic technicians, registered and other dietetics professionals. With a mission to accelerate improvements in global health and well-being through food and nutrition, the Academy is committed to improving the nation's health through education, research, and advocacy for dietetic professionals. The Academy would like to offer the following comments on the ISA related to nutrition standards.

Section I: Vocabulary/Code Set/Terminology Standards and Implementation Specifications

Representing Patient Allergies and Intolerances; Environmental Substances

The Academy recommends adding [Common Environmental Substances for Allergy and Intolerance documentation \(2.16.840.1.113762.1.4.1186.4\)](#) as Applicable Value Set(s) and Starter Set(s). This value set was developed by the HL7 Patient Care WG with participation from the Academy to support alignment across systems and was based on observed frequencies of use in large health systems.

Representing Patient Allergies and Intolerances; Medications

The Academy recommends adding [Common Drug Classes for Allergy and Intolerance documentation \(2.16.840.1.113762.1.4.1186.2\)](#) and [Common Drug Substances for Allergy and Intolerance documentation \(2.16.840.1.113762.1.4.1186.1\)](#) as Applicable Value Set(s) and Starter Set(s). These value sets were developed by the HL7 Patient Care WG with participation from the Academy to support alignment across systems and were based on observed frequencies of use in large health systems.

The Academy recommends adding a Nutrition section with the following details:

Section II: Content/Structure Standards and Implementation Specifications

Exchanging Diet and Nutrition Orders Across the Continuum of Care

The second bullet point listed for the Limitations, Dependencies, and Preconditions for Consideration references that work is underway to create a HL7 CDA R2 Implementation Guide: C-CDA R2.1 Supplemental Templates for Nutrition, Release 1 (US Realm). The work for this Implementation Guide was completed in May 2018 and balloted as a Standard for Trial Use. The Academy recommends this Implementation Guide be listed in the grid of standards with the following details:

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Additionally, work is currently underway to develop more nutrition related FHIR resources. The Academy recommends ONC include the work on these standards as they become available and at a minimum include them with the Limitations, Dependencies, and Preconditions for Consideration. Currently, a draft version of [HL7 FHIR Nutrition Intake resource](#) has been included in the FHIR build, which the Academy recommends including in the ISA in order to receive feedback on the resource.

Section IV: Administrative Standards and Implementation Specifications

Health Care Attachments to Support Claims, Referrals and Authorizations

Under this section in the standards grid, the following HL7 standards are listed as having a cost:

- HL7 CDA® R2 Attachment Implementation Guide: Exchange of C-CDA Based Documents, Release 1 - US Realm
- HL7 CDA R2 Implementation Guide: Consolidated CDA Templates for Clinical Notes (US Realm) Draft Standard for Trial Use Release 2.1
- HL7 Implementation Guide for CDA® Release 2: Additional CDA R2 Templates - Clinical Documents for Payers – Set 1, Release 1.1 (US Realm)

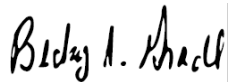
HL7 standards are provided at no cost. The Academy recommends the grid for these standards should be updated to indicate the cost for these standards is free.

Questions and Requests for Stakeholder Feedback

The Academy commends ONC for adding specialty care/setting pages as a quick link to standards related to these specific areas. As requested in question19-4, the Academy recommends ONC add specialty care/setting pages for Nutrition, Allergies, and Social Determinants of Health. Many of the standards related to these areas are scattered among the other sections of the ISA. Having a page for each of these three areas will better allow implementers to meet the interoperability needs of these specialty care/setting areas.
